OIMC dedicates new conference office

On Sunday afternoon, August 14, 2016, under an overcast sky, Bishop Robert E. Hayes, Jr., retiring bishop of the Oklahoma Area, dedicated the new Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference office. With approximately 50 persons in attendance, Bishop Hayes, shared with the congregation the process that the conference went through to be able to come to the place we are at today. Those in attendance represented not only members of the OIMC but also from the Oklahoma Conference and from the neighborhood.

It was shared that when the facility was first built it was to be a Shalom Zone facility. Shalom ministry historically is rooted in the biblical prophetic tradition and a practical theological interpretation of Jeremiah 29:1-12. The United Methodist Shalom Initiative ignited in the spring of 1992, in the aftermath of the social uprising in Los Angeles

following the not-guilty verdict for the police charged with beating Rodney King. The LA riots devastated the downtown neighborhoods and caused racial strife and violence between neighbors. Seven UM churches got involved in rebuilding the community and created the first "shalom zone." From there it spread to other jurisdictions of the United Methodist Church in the USA, Africa and Haiti.

After the facility closed as a Shalom Zone and after the membership of South Lee UMC began to dwindle, South Lee began using the facility as a place of worship. When South Lee UMC decided to close its doors, the facility was offered to OIMC. After some renovations the OIMC staff moved into the building July 15. A special thank you was extended to Rev. Greg Tener, District Superintendent of the Heartland District, who was instrumental in the whole process.

Oklahoma Area Receives New Bishop

Newly elected , Bishop James "Jimmy" Nunn was appointed as the bishop of the Oklahoma Area to replace retiring, Bishop Robert E. Hayes, Jr., at the South Central Jurisdiction Conference held in July in Wichita, Kansas.

Bishop Nunn has been mission and administration director of the Northwest Texas Conference based in Lubbock, Texas since 2011, serving for two years before that as the Northwest Texas Conference's director of church development.

As director of mission and administration, Bishop Nunn led efforts to plant new churches and recruit young and diverse clergy, as well as developing new leaders. He had previously served as pastor of three different churches in Lubbock and as a district superintendent.

A native of Lubbock and a pastor since 1981, Bishop Nunn earned his bachelor's degree from McMurry University in Abilene, Texas, and his master of divinity and doctor of ministry degrees from Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky.

Nunn was a delegate and chair of the Northwest Texas delegation to General Conference in 2008 and 2016, and he served as an alternate in 2004. He has served the general church on the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry as well as General Council on Finance and Administration. This year, he has also served as a delegate to the World Methodist Conference. He has been a four-time delegate to the South Central Jurisdictional Conference.

He and his wife, Mary, a piano teacher with her own studio, are the parents of two grown children.

A consecration service for Bishop Nunn will be held November 6, 2016 at the Angie Smith Chapel, Oklahoma City University campus. A meal will be served following the service.

Bishop, his wife and daughter, Jaime and son-in-law Scott, were in the area August 10-11. A luncheon was held in their honor on the 11th at Norman First American UMC where the bishop was presented with his first Pendleton blanket and Mary her first shawl.

OIMC responds to two different ministries

Little did those who had signed up to participate in a mission project to Sager Brown UMCOR Depot realize they would be responding to the needs of flood victims. While at Sager Brown, August 21-26, the team (Rev. July Tecumseh, Rev. Margaret Johnson, Rev. Rosa Baker and Josephine Deere) helped process over 1,000 cleaning buckets that were taken to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to be distributed to flood victims. There is still a need as the supply of buckets continues to be depleted.

We will continue to collect the cleaning buckets until November 1 and with the help of Oklahoma Conference the buckets will be delivered. Items for the buckets are:

1 5-gallon bucket with lid (Buckets from fast-food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned. Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner. Advertisements on the outside are acceptable.)
1 50-oz bottle or 2 25-oz bottles of liquid

laundry detergent – (bottles only)

1 12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water – no spray cleaners.

1 12-16 oz. bottle dish soap, any brand
1 can air freshener (aerosol or pump)
1 6-14 oz. insect-repellent spray (aerosol or spray pump with protective cover)
1 scrub brush (plastic or wooden handle)
18 cleaning wipes (handi-wipes or reusable wipes, remove from packaging – no terry cleaning towels)

7 sponges (removed from wrapper, no cellulose sponges due to mold issues)
5 scouring pads (removed from wrapper, no stainless steel, Brillo pads or SOS pads – nothing with soap built in)
50 clothespins

1 100-ft or 2 50-ft clothesline (cotton or plastic)

24 roll heavy-duty trash bags (33-45 gallon sizes – remove from the box) 5 dust masks

2 pairs kitchen dishwashing gloves (should be durable enough for multiple uses – remove from packaging) 1 pair work gloves (cotton with leather palm or all leather)

Place all liquid items in the bucket first. Place remaining items in the bucket fitting them around and between the liquid items. Sponges, scouring pads, clothespins and trash bags can be separated in order to fit all of the items in the bucket. Make sure the lid is closed securely. All items must be new except for the actual bucket and lid. All cleaning agents must be liquid and in plastic containers. NO powders, please. If you cannot find the requested size of a liquid item, use a smaller size. If all of the items on the list are not included in the bucket place a label on the bucket indicating what has been omitted.

On Monday, August 29, 2016, Rev. David Wilson along with Justin Phillips and Dallas Parker traveled to Standing Rock Sioux Reservation in North Dakota to observe and raise awareness about the challenges the Dakota Access Oil Pipeline is creating for Native peoples.

Why must the church be involved? In the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church, paragraph 160 in the 2012 Book of Discipline it states: All creation is the Lord's, and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it. Water, air, soil, minerals, energy, resources, plants, animal life, and space are to be valued and conserved because they are God's creation and not solely because they are useful to human beings. God has granted us stewardship of creation.

At this writing we, the OIMC, wait to hear how we can support our brothers and sisters who are facing this dilemma.
